

GLASS FROGS

G lass frogs are arboreal amphibians that live above water in the Amazon rainforest. Their nickname is 'crystals of the rainforest' because crystals are transparent and so are these frogs.

An unusual feature of glass frogs is that their skin is transparent which allows you to see their organs. Yuck! Right? Some glass frogs also have bones that are a soft baby green.

Glass frogs are known to live in the Amazon rainforest but they are also found in other places in Central and South America. Some species are rarely seen because they are endangered.

Glass frogs eat insects with soft bodies which makes them a very important part of the ecosystem because they help to keep the number of insects under control.

Glass frogs do have predators such as mammals and birds. They are well-camouflaged because they can use their seethrough bodies to take on any colour or pattern.

The glass frog lays its eggs on the undersides of leaves, usually about 20-30 eggs at a time. These eggs are transparent too. The eggs hatch into tiny tadpoles. An interesting fact about these tiny amphibians is that some bury themselves underground to hide from predators while they are very young.

Sadly some species of glass frogs are endangered because their habitats are being destroyed. Glass frogs can be kept as pets but they need a lot of looking after.
